In 2011, the Association celebrates its Diamond Jubilee year. The Association was founded in 1951 as the Cambridgeshire Local History Council. In 2006, it was decided to change our name to the Cambridgeshire Association for Local History (CALH) to re-emphasise the organisation's founding principles and to highlight its important role of caring for the future of Cambridgeshire's past. Apart from this umbrella role, the other main object of the Association is to encourage and support the study of Local and Social History in Cambridgeshire.

Affiliated Membership of the Association by Local and Social History Clubs, Groups and Societies or any other organisation with similar aims is strongly encouraged, as the CALH acts as your Representative Body. The Association always endeavours to look after Cambridgeshire society's best interests and to act as an Information and Networking Hub for Local and Social History in Cambridgeshire. The more local clubs and societies present a uniform and united front, the more we will be able to support each other and influence change, especially in this period of uncertainty in the county's facilities.

We also have our own individual membership and hold regular monthly meetings. Our monthly lectures start at 2.15pm and last for about an hour; they are normally held at the St John's Hall, Blinco Grove, off Hills Road, Cambridge, except for the joint meetings with other Societies. There is free parking, but it is always advisable to come early. There is also the opportunity for questions and discussion, and while enjoying a cup of tea after the lecture, there is the chance to find out what is happening in the Local and Social History world in Cambridgeshire.

Entry to these meetings is free for individual and family members, it is just £1 for affiliated and associate society members, and £2.50 for guests and non-members, and everyone is always extremely welcome. The CALH also organises a wide range of summer excursions and local walks.

The CALH also holds an annual spring conference, with a strong local history theme. These are held at various locations around Cambridgeshire, in normal years usually in the same venue, where the AGM & Awards ceremony was held in the previous May. In 2011, the Diamond Jubilee Spring Conference entitled "Educating the People" will be held on Saturday 9th April in the Henry Morris Hall at Sawston Village College. In May each year, the CALH holds its AGM and the "Cambridgeshire Local History Awards", this again is held in various locations around Cambridgeshire.

The Association also produces a range of publications as part of its membership package, these include the annual 'Review', local society and event gazetteer the Preview, a comprehensive Cambridgeshire Speakers List and a bi-annual newsletter the 'Bulletin', these are issued to all members. The Association also has an award nominated website – www.calh.org.uk
